KEY INSPIRATION

The laser cut jali pattern is inspired from the pattern which is existing on the door of the House of Ming, to make it look symmetrical and in the same lines of the existing concept.

The main inspiration in this concept is the Chinese umbrellas, which is refined here by placing it all over the place and using lacquered glass as the material. It is basically an oil-paper umbrella which is originated in China and was used initially in weddings.

Concept 2

KEY INSPIRATION

The inspiration behind this is the chinese artwork. The native chinese armies had established the Ming dynasty, with the decline in the traditional art, Ming rule introduced all types of art such as pottery, paintings, calligraphy, etc. Here the essence of traditional chinese artworks introduced by Ming dynasty is transformed into design.



Concept 3

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SIDE WALL INSTALLATION CONCEPTS

The moon gate is a traditional element of Chinese architecture - It is a circular opening in a garden wall, which acts as a passageway for pedestrians. They signify diverse spiritual meanings, based on the principles of every shape, tile, and material used for the construction of the same. The polished wooden circumference of the moon gate is lit up from the inside, as an aesthetic element which also serves as a warm welcome. It is flanked by golden bars upon which lays a traditional knot which signifies many things, including a gesture of wishing someone a long and healthy life, and good fortune, made in brass. The bars signify a filter, which, in accordance to feng shui, blocks negative energies and bad luck.

Concept 1



This concept takes inspiration from traditional Chinese windows, in front of which there is a bonsai plant. This is done to blend into the interior features of the Taj Mansingh lobby, which have been inspired from architectural elements which are usually only used outdoors. The bonsai in front of the window is open to two contradictory yet equally feasible interpretations - the first being that you are indoors in front of the window, looking out, the second being that you are outdoors, looking at a bonsai which is outside a window.

Concept 2



The cage concept draws inspiration from an abstract perspective about cages - Much like doors, do they enslave us, or protect us? The cage, therefore, has been constructed in a way that is open from one side, and closed from the other, in one unbroken string of curves. These half cages are flanked yet again with the Mystic knot, which is used four times, to signify four of the knot's principles - Good health, good fortune, good luck, and endless love.

The concept of the "incomplete" screen is based upon an ideology of modern, minimalist Chinese practicality, fused with the ancient traditional art of knotting. The minimalistic frame does away with structural elements which were not completely necessary, and has used other structural elements to support two different kinds of knots - The first being a knot for good health, good fortune, good luck, and endless love, The other knot signifies strength, energy, and endurance.

Concept 4

The giant ming plate concept is a modern take on the principle of sharing bounties, but in an abstract way. The giant plate signifies a large bounty, and the grid represents different beneficiaries. The portion of the plate which exists in each grid, is a representation of how much can be shared.

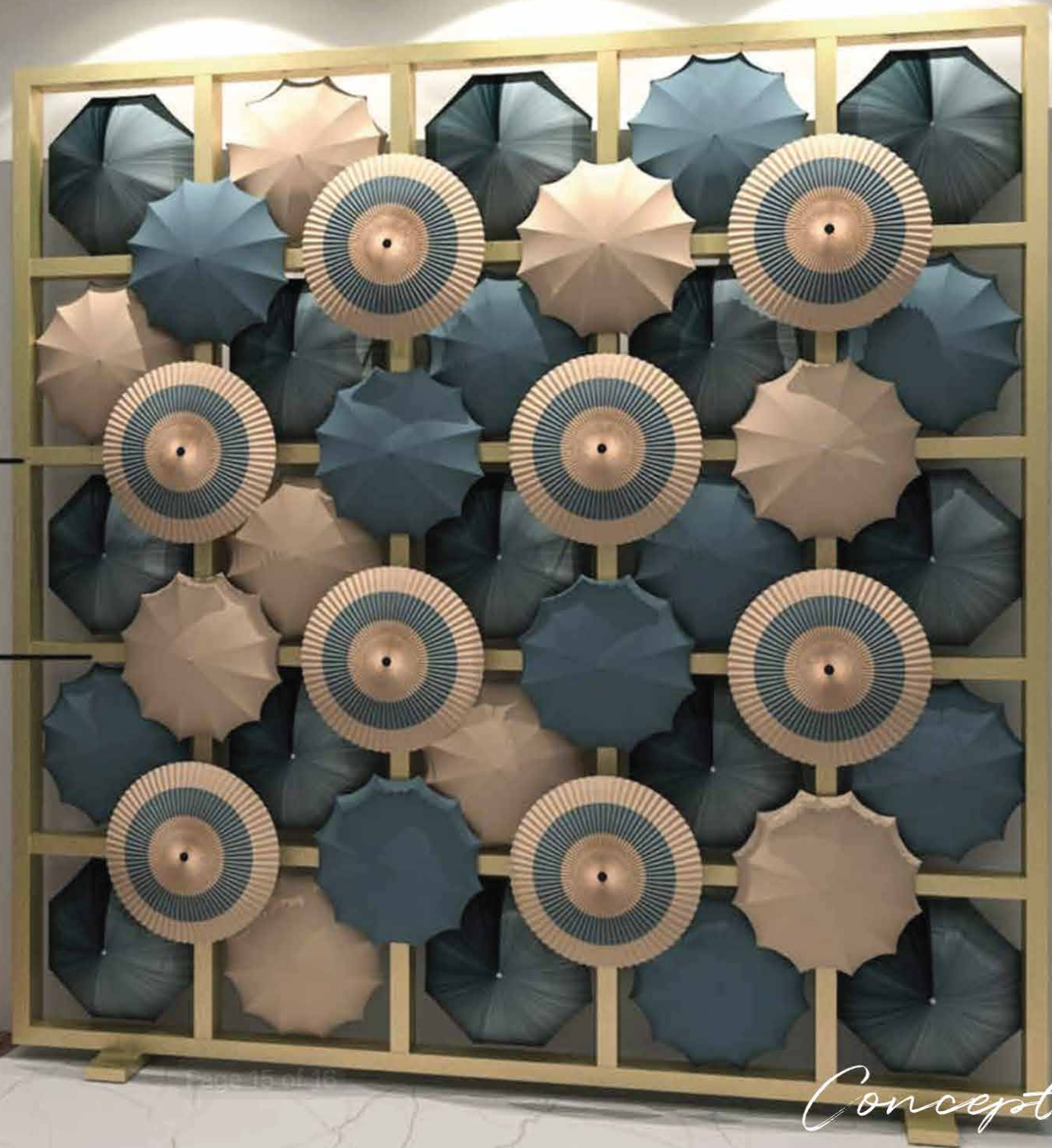
Concept 5
